What is the Section 3 Program?

Section 3 is a part of the federal Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Act of 1968 intended to ensure that new job, training, and contracting opportunities generated by HUDfunded Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority (CMHA) projects and programs benefit low-income persons residing in CMHA housing and the broader community, to the greatest extent feasible. The program helps to foster local economic development, neighborhood economic improvement, and economic self-sufficiency.

What is a Section 3 Resident?

Section 3 residents may receive preferences for <u>new</u> hiring opportunities and for training opportunities related to CMHA's HUD-funded projects and programs.

To be eligible, a resident must:

1) Be a current Public Housing resident or HUD Youthbuild program participant

OR

2) Live in the Columbus Metropolitan Area AND

Meet the Section 3 household income limits established by HUD (see Resident registration form)

For construction projects, preference is given to residents of the property or neighborhood where the project is located.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. If I am a current Public Housing resident or Youthbuild participant, am I automatically considered a Section 3 resident?

Yes. However, you must register to be in the program and receive notification of job and training opportunities.

2. How do I certify that I am Section 3 eligible?

Any person in a low-income household in the Columbus region (see income limits on registration form), can certify that they are a Section 3 resident by completing and signing the registration form.

3. Do I have to submit any documents with my registration form?

No. However, a person seeking a Section 3 training and employment preference is responsible for providing documentation of income or residency if requested.

4. Is there a minimum age for registration?

Teens can register, but there may be age requirements for jobs or training opportunities. A parent or guardian must certify Section 3 eligibility for persons under age 18.

5. What does CMHA do with the information on my registration form?

CMHA will maintain a database of the information on the registration forms. When there is an employment or training opportunity that is a match for your skills and interests, we will notify you. We may also share your information with a contractor, employer, or training provider.

6. What type of employment opportunities are covered by Section 3 requirements?

Thirty percent of all <u>new</u> employment opportunities created as a direct result of the expenditure of HUD funds by CMHA are to be directed to Section 3 residents. This includes management and administrative jobs, technical, professional, construction, and maintenance jobs at all levels.

7. Are Section 3 residents guaranteed jobs or training opportunities?

Section 3 is not an entitlement program. Employers and training providers use their normal screening processes to determine qualifications and eligibility for a specific job or program and make the decision about who to hire or admit. Section 3 provides preference to Section 3 residents for new hires, but not a guarantee.

How to become a registered Section 3 resident
